

heart of the matter

Allison Durham Speer

The first time young Allison Durham sat down to a big family dinner at Brock and Faye Speer's house, she wasn't fully aware of the fact that she was breaking bread with Southern Gospel royalty.

The small Kentucky town she grew up in had only one radio station; and it played contemporary Christian music, so Allison was more familiar with Amy Grant, Sandi Patty, Russ Taff and the Imperials than the legendary Speer family. But she was still mightily impressed.

"It was the most wonderful feast I've ever experienced," Allison tells me. "The food was wonderful, but it wasn't the best part. That family sat for three hours around a table and talked and joked and laughed and cut up and thoroughly enjoyed each other! It was the most marvelous thing I'd ever felt. I had a ball with them; they were genuine, loving and concerned about one another. It had such an impact on me, I just fell in love with Brock and Faye and the whole family atmosphere they had created." That's not all she fell in love with—the "family atmosphere" included Brock and Faye's son Brian Speer, who had oh-so-casually brought her home to dinner that night. He was working as the financial officer at Homeland Records, the company that had just signed Allison to a recording contract. Since she was a little leery of getting involved with anyone in the music business, Brian was

careful not to call that evening a "date." But despite her initial reservations, Brian's persistence and the loving embrace of his family won her over; and before too long the Parksville, Ky., girl with the soaring soprano voice had become Allison Durham Speer.

Allison was raised on her grandfather's tenant farm, an idyllic country environment she describes as "poor in the basics of life, but wholesome and loving." She grew up singing but was never encouraged to pursue music as a career. "In a farm community, you might pick a guitar or a banjo every now and then, but you don't travel and sing for a living; you stay on the farm and work. It was a little bit of a trying experience because the dream I had was so unattainable in their eyes. Mama kept saying, 'Let's just make sure you have something to fall back on...'"

During Allison's second year at the University of Kentucky, fellow singer Squire Parsons introduced her to Maurice Templeton, who immediately booked her on all of his Christian cruises with speakers such as Charles Stanley, Bailey Smith and James Kennedy. This brought her to the attention of Bill Traylor of Homeland Records, who signed her as a

Southern Gospel artist. By the time Allison became a full-fledged Speer in 1989, Brian had begun serving as her business manager, and she had done her musical homework. "I realized I needed to take a little journey into the history of this music I came to love," Allison says, "and that's when I discovered the richness of those incredible old Speer family recordings." It was also around this time that Allison first met the Gaithers on one of the Templeton cruises. "I sang one night with Bill and Gloria sitting right on the front row, which is enough to give you a heart attack," she laughingly recalls. "But afterward Bill said 'Hey, what do you think about touring a little bit with the Vocal Band?'" That connection led to a contract with Star Song Records and further expanded her singing ministry, which eventually grew to include featured roles in many Homecoming videos.

In the last few years Allison has also worked with two mission organizations that are very close to her heart, traveling to Russia, Bosnia and the Phillipines with the International Aid Organization and the American Leprosy Mission. She says, "I believe that if you truly desire to lead, you have to serve. I think every Christian would benefit from doing some kind of mission work in a foreign country. My eyes were opened to the great, great needs and dire circumstances that people are living in around the world, and it changed my life completely."

Allison has also had a long-standing desire to share some of the communication and performance skills she has developed during her 25-year career with young ministers and musicians. In October of 2008 that dream was realized as Allison held the first four-day "Elijah Conference" just outside of Nashville. She gathered an experienced group of industry professionals and speakers to help instruct attendees in the many different aspects of

music ministry. "We're putting all of our efforts into training gospel musicians in areas like communication, using humor successfully, vocalizing, spiritually preparing for a concert, successful musical and verbal segues between songs, booking, management, nonprofit status—everything we can think of to help them grow their ministry and take it to the next level," Allison says excitedly. "All we really have to do is turn the light on, and then the Lord leads them down the road to where they need to be. It's absolutely the most rewarding thing I've ever done."

Ironically, Allison's newfound enthusiasm for sharing what she has learned with others came on the heels of one of the most discouraging times of her life. Describing herself as personally and professionally burned out,

Allison says, "About four years ago I was ready to give it all up. I told Brian, 'Don't book any more concerts, I'm quitting, I'm done.' There was absolutely no desire to keep on doing what we were doing. I had no passion, no zeal, I didn't love the concerts, I didn't even care about the audience anymore."

But one afternoon while walking through a mall in Nashville, Allison saw a woman she recognized. "It was a little lady by the name of Lois J. Huddleston, a song evangelist. Years ago when I was just a teenager, she had come to our tiny church in Kentucky and stood up on a stump and sang about Jesus. We sat down on a bench, and I began to talk to her about how I was just so very weary and tired

of it all. She said, 'I am sensing two things—that you don't have a love for God's people, and you don't have a love for God's Word.' Lois grabbed my hand and began to pray, whispering very softly in the middle of that mall for over an hour. Finally she said, 'I want you to promise me that every day when you get up you will say, "Lord, give me a love for the blood-bought people of God and give me a love for your Word. Let me eat it and breathe it to your glory."' Allison's voice breaks as she says, "I made her that promise out of my longstanding love and respect for her. Even though I didn't feel like it, I did it; and the Lord began to do a work in me. He gave me strength and courage and let me see that those people sitting in those aisles and pews were beloved to Him. And when I began to really see the love God had extended to me and the grace He'd given me, I was renewed, and my heart was refreshed."

Allison's hunger for Scripture has now expanded her ministry to include teaching the Bible at women's conferences. "That's the main thing I want to pass on to others," she says. "If we feast on that Word and drink that living water every day, He will be our sustenance and our provision." ■

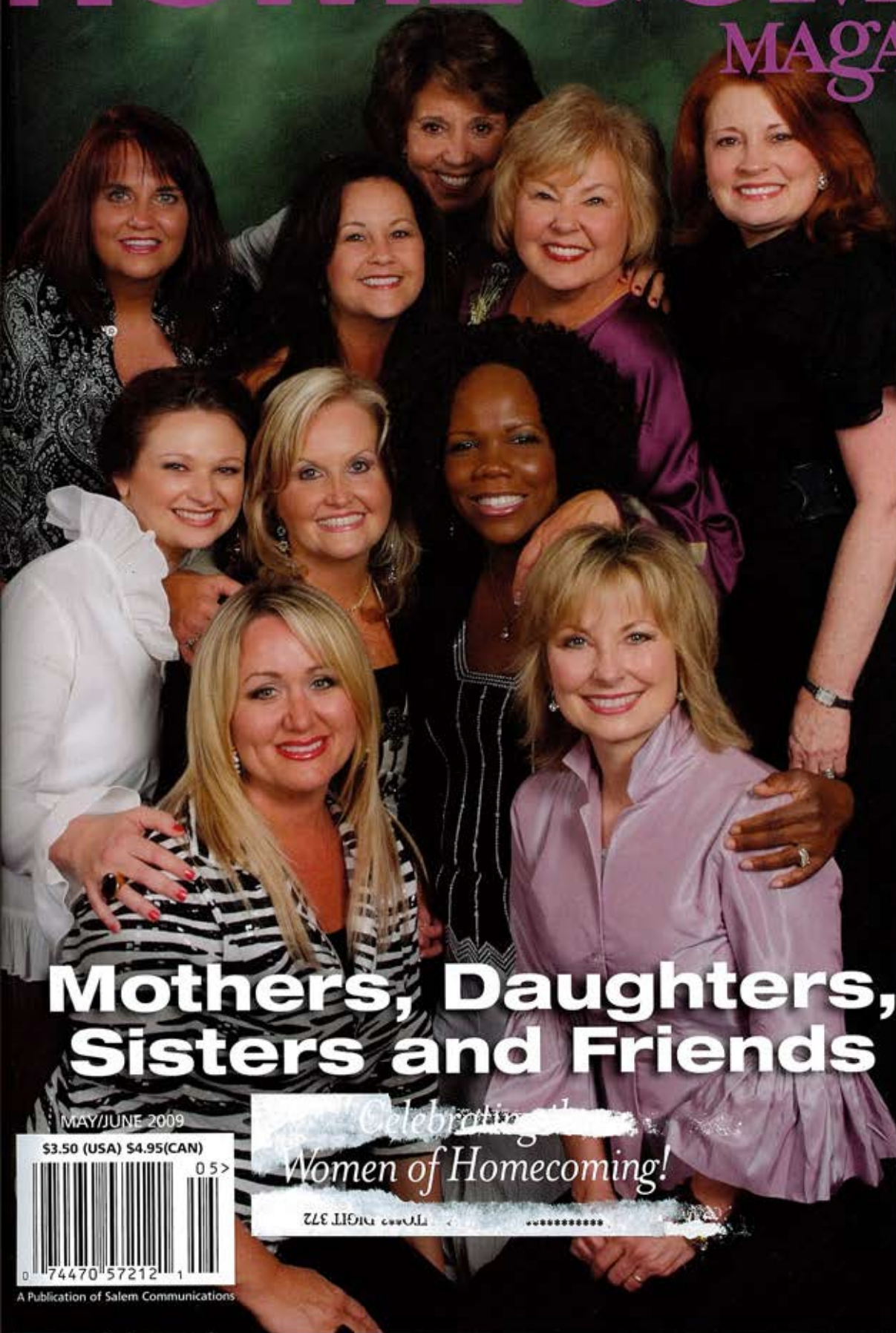
